

To the Editor:

The June 3 Pioneer Express contained an editorial by Ed Mullaney suggesting that the climbing US federal debt is a result of tax cuts favoring the wealthy. Analysis of federal government and IRS tax return data refute the claims of Mr. Mullaney and the sources he cited.

There are many metrics that coincide with the rapid rise in our national debt. Just because tax cuts coincide with national debt increases does not mean they "caused" our national debt to increase.

The strongest correlating metric to our rising debt is federal government SPENDING. Since the economic Growth and Tax Relief Reconciliation Act of 2001, our underlying economy (GDP) has grown at an average inflation adjusted rate of 2%. Federal government tax receipts during this period also increased at an inflation adjusted rate of 2%. Contrast that with the fact federal government spending increased at an average rate of 5.8% during the same period of time. (Source: Table 1.3 https://www.whitehouse.gov/omb/historical-tables/)

In other words, over the past 22 years our federal government spent at a rate almost three times greater than the growth rate of the underlying economy and almost three times greater than the tax revenues collected.

Mr. Mullaney suggests that if we just taxed the rich more we wouldn't have a debt crisis. But that's simply not true. How do we know this? Look at the years we taxed the wealthy at higher rates. Between 1940 and 2000 there were 58 years when top marginal tax rates ranged from 40% to 94%. During these 58 years we taxed the wealthiest Americans at much higher rates, yet our federal government spent more than it collected in 52 of those 58 vears. In fact, our federal government has spent more than it received in taxes in 72 of the past 84 years. Regardless of the rates we taxed the wealthy, the federal government has demonstrated a history of spending more than it receives.

Additionally, Mr. Mullaney cited May 2024 Newsweek article claiming tax rate of 400 richest was 23% compared to the tax rate of 24% for bottom half of workers. These numbers are patently false. Based on the latest IRS tax return data in 2021, The top 1 percent of taxpayers paid a 25.9 percent average rate, nearly eight times higher than the 3.3 percent average rate paid by the bottom half of taxpayers (Source: Who Pays Federal Income Taxes? Latest Federal Income Tax Data (taxfoundation.org)). The claim that tax cuts transferred a greater tax burden to lower-income workers is absurd.

Beyond what I have cited above, there is plethora of data supporting the argument that excessive federal government spending (expansion) is indeed the epicentre of the national debt crisis this country faces. The narrative that wealthy individuals don't pay their fair share and are to blame for our debt is a disingenuous and divisive diversion from reality. Elected leaders with the courage to reduce the size and scope of our federal government are exactly what this country needs.



White-tailed deer fawns are usually born about six months after mating. In Northern Wisconsin that is late May through June. A yearling doe will usually give birth to one fawn while older does can give birth to twins or sometimes even triplets.

When fawns are born, the mother takes several steps to carefully prepare the fawn for concealment from predators. First, the mother will take her time to clean the fawn to remove her own scent. She will also consume the afterbirth, not only to reduce the risk of predation, but to recycle nutrients that are necessary for milk production. Within hours of birth, a fawn will begin to test its legs, ultimately wobbling awkwardly along behind their mother on their way to the best available hiding spot. Once a safe distance away from the birthing spot, the fawn will instinctually lie down in cover. The mother will leave the immediate area so she doesn't attract predators. This all happens within about ten hours of birth.

For the first seven to 10 days of life, a fawn will spend up to 95 percent of its time bedded. Hiding is the primary survival mechanism of fawns; they are not abandoned by the doe. So, it's best to leave them be. While bedded, a fawn has a very rapid heartbeat of around 175 beats per minute. When a fawn senses danger is close, it will lower its head and drop its ears, the heart rate will fall to around 60 beats per minute, and the breathing will become slower and deeper all to try and avoid detection by predators. At about 10 days old they are able to run from danger.


Fawns weigh about 6-8 pounds at birth. Immediately after birth the doe will nurse the fawn. The milk of a doe is rich in fat, protein, dry solids and energy, helping the fawn grow. Fawns of multiple fawn litters will grow slower than fawns of single litters. Fawns usually double their birth weight in roughly two weeks and triple it within a month. On average, fawns gain 0.44 pounds per day during this time. Does are under a lot of stress during this time in order to feed the fawns. Does nurse their fawns about four times a day when newborn and will continue to nurse them until they are about four months old.

At about two weeks old fawns will start to browse tender vegetation. They learn from their mother what plants to eat. Generally, does obtain their peak weight at four years old with an average weight of 100 pounds. Bucks usually reach their peak weight at age five or six and have an average weight of 150 pounds. Deer spend more time eating than in any other activity.

The white-tailed deer is an herbivore, it eats plants. Deer graze on tree leaves, broad-leaved herbs, and berries in the summer and acorns, grass, and herbs during the fall. During the winter, deer munch on white cedar, twigs, nuts, fruits, and corn and in the spring, deer eat grass, wheat, and alfalfa. In the winter they also eat buds and twigs from maples, dogwood, aspen, willow and sumac. Deer have a four-chambered stomach that allows them to digest these plant foods. They gobble up their food quickly and hardly even chew. Later as they are resting, they cough up their food and re-chew it. Deer fawns have a set of baby teeth just like humans. They are born with four teeth and in the next few months develop baby incisors and premolars. By the time they are about 18 months old, permanent teeth will have replaced the baby teeth. Contrary to popular belief, fawns are actually not born odorless, in fact, the unique scent of each individual fawn is actually how the mother identifies her own. Twins and triplets are also hidden separately to increase their survival probability. Fawns have a red and brown coat with white spots. This coat helps them blend in with the sunlight and the shade. The average number of spots on a fawn coat range from 272 to 342, with the size of each spot ranging from 0.24 to 0.51 inch in diameter. Fawns will lose this coat in August and September when they start replacing their summer coat with a heavier, grey brown winter coat. 

Avoid spreading invasive species

The Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) asks the public to take simple precautions to avoid spreading invasive plants and animals in June, which is Invasive Species Action Month, and all year long.

Invasive species are nonnative plants, animals and diseases that cause great ecological, environmental or economic harm. Some have already been found in Wisconsin, while others pose a large risk of surviving and causing problems if they are introduced and established here.

The state's invasive species rule makes it illegal to possess, transport, transfer or introduce certain invasive species in Wisconsin without a permit. The regulations designate which species are Restricted or Prohibited based on factors including the degree of harm they may cause to people, the native ecology or the economy.

How You Can Help

To prevent the establishment and spread of invasives, the DNR encourages reporting invasive species and offers the following tips.

While hiking and camping:

• Clean mud and dirt off shoes.

• Remove seeds and burs from clothing.

•Stay on designated trails, roads and other developed areas. Avoid areas infested with invasive species; "When in doubt, stay out!"

• Follow Wisconsin's firewood rules to avoid moving harmful invasive pests and pathogens like the emerald ash borer, spongy moth and oak wilt disease.

While fishing and boating:

•Clean all recreational equipment and gear after every use to protect Wisconsin's waters from fish diseases and aquatic invasives like quagga and zebra mussels, Eurasian water-milfoil, New Zealand mudsnails and Asian clams.

Inspect gear for dirt, mud, seeds and other debris, removing as much as possible before and after launching.
Drain all water from gear and compartments before leaving your fishing location.

• Dry gear for five or more days between uses to help destroy invasive organisms.

• Never move live fish away from any waterbody.

While gardening and doing leisure activities: 0149Add beauty and variety to your yard with native plants to benefit pollinators, birds and other wildlife. Or add traditional gardening plants that are noninvasive. The DNR's Plant Native Plants webpage is a great resource to get started.

• Learn how to identify and remove potential problem plants from your property, including Bishop's goutweed, burning bush, creeping bellflower, Dame's rocket, Amur honeysuckle, water hyacinth, water lettuce and European frog-bit.
